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HIGHLIGHTS FROM CHURCH COUNCIL

Wouldn't it be a shame if your church spent years without a pastor, and failed to make the most of it? Rather than enter a season of paralysing self-pity, consider your vacancy a gift from God, a strategic turning point. Nothing will position your church better to attract your next pastor than to be busy about the Lord's business while you wait. And whether the wait is long or short, this day in front of us is the day God has given. Let's not waste it.

After roughly 5 months of pastoral vacancy, it would be an overstatement to say that things are ticking along just as when Greg was here, but nevertheless there is a sense of steadiness.

One of the biggest contributing factors to this is that we have six young people who have taken on the challenge of lay preaching and leading worship, and - with the support of Pastor Steen Olsen, some other visiting pastors, Prayer Healing Team and those newly licensed for sacramental ministry - this group is collectively filling the most prominent aspect of a pastor's role. I believe that this has reduced much of the anxiety about pastoral vacancy that might otherwise be felt across the congregation.

The model that we have long been using at GGLC - that our ministries are generally run by staff and volunteers and supported by pastor, rather than run by pastor - has meant that Vine Kids, Messy Music, Messy Church, Ignite, Arise, Young Adults and Cafe Connect have been able to continue uninterrupted, and the Pastoral Care, Worship, Christian Education, Church Council and other management teams can carry on.

During this period there has also been the tragic loss to the Rawolle family of Kirsten. Our thoughts and prayers continue to be with the Rawolles. It has affected many deeply. I would like to thank all of those who have been providing support in various ways, and also remind everybody that ongoing pastoral care is available. At such times, the void left by pastoral vacancy is vividly exposed, and in the midst of this tragedy we can be thankful for the support we received from a number of pastors, particularly Matt Bishop who provided a team of counsellors, and we can be most grateful that Greg was able to return from Queensland temporarily to assist. Greg's travelling costs were borne by the LCA Transfer Fund and we thank the SA/NT District Office for authorising this.

The process of building the new manse is moving along and I hope you will all be not too judgemental on the quality of reporting of progress that you have been receiving in the "Pastor wants a House/House Wants a Pastor" series in this publication.

On the finance front otherwise, the Finance Team will be meeting shortly to assess progress for the year to date and a summary will be provided at the AGM on May 26. It is important to remember that during vacancy, giving is as important as ever, as we continue to pay an amount linked to a pastor's salary into the LCA Transfer Fund during this period. This is 90% of salary for the first 6 months, 70% to 12 months, then 50% for over 12 months. Money paid into this fund is used to pay visiting pastors for their time and travel expenses, as well as to support pastors moving between positions in the LCANZ.

And on the topic of giving, the LLL is transitioning from being a bank to being a Religious Charitable Development Fund. Everyone who holds an LLL account should have received communications about this; if not, there is copious information available on their website. As a result of these changes, using an LLL account for REG will no longer be possible for most people (as most people will fall into the "non-associate" category). Please be aware that the LLL will still facilitate REG, but your contributions must come from a non-LLL account. The difference between REG and doing a direct bank transfer to the church account is that REG remains anonymous. If confidential giving is important to you, please fill in the REG forms with the LLL. (Please also be aware that we are very careful to remove any names that are included in bank transactions when they are copied into the church accounts).

have been working to end it. There are over 100 names on the current list of pastors that are eligible to receive a call. The team shortlisted 15 names initially, and after some advice from the District Office, made initial contact with five. More extensive discussions have been had with two.

To ensure that due diligence has been carried out, another eight names have since been added to the shortlist and are currently being reviewed. One or more recommendations will be put to the congregation at a call meeting. A call meeting is an official meeting of the congregation and requires a quorum of one quarter of the members to make a decision to call a pastor. Due to the way the timing has worked out, the May 26 AGM will include an agenda item which will be to address the matter of calling a pastor. Please do your best to be available for this meeting.








Arguably, there is no better time to be building a manse than in a period of pastoral vacancy. This wasn't our plan at all, but as we know "A man's heart deviseth his way: but the LORD directeth his steps" (Prov 16:9). And we'll need some steps as well, but we'll cover that in a future issue of this new series that can now claim to be a series by virtue of reaching a second episode without a name change. In the current issue, things start getting dirty.

Yes, dirt has moved. Lots of it. And quite a bit of it fell on Roger and Will... but let's not get ahead of ourselves. The last episode ended on a cliffhanger with promises of contractual obligations to be met and working bees. Here's how it all played out.

A building contract from a builder can be paraphrased as "Sure we'll build your house. But you have to do some things first... or else!". In our case the things we had to complete by April 12 included:



- A retaining wall at the top of the easement, to stop the house sliding into the gully;
- A rock wall at the front, to stop the bedroom falling onto the road;
- Running services under the rock wall, since that's easier to do before the rock wall is there:
- All weather access to the house from the road (6m of driveway at a stretch);
- Clearing of weeds and any other organic matter;
- Application for an electrical connection;
- Providing proof that we have the money to pay for it all.

And the "or else" was the threat of a "price review" (read as "price increase") in an industry where materials and labour costs are doing their best to keep up with skyrocketing rent and house prices.





That all seemed a little too easy, so we added to the list:

- Another retaining wall adjacent to the neighbour's boundary, to stop their house falling onto the new manse; this wall could have waited until the site was benched, but it suited us to bring it forward;
- Yet another retaining wall, on the southern boundary along the gully, to stop the retaining wall that's stopping the house from sliding into the gully from sliding into the gully. This one is our own initiative, not required under the building contract and not tied to the April 12 deadline; it will add significant value as it creates another 150m2 of usable space, facilitating access to the back of the property, and will in due course permit a good sized shed to be built in the back corner.

Many of the tasks were easily dealt with but we enlisted the help of professionals for the walls. Pascoe Earthmoving completed the rock wall in mid March and Williams Retaining installed the concrete posts for the first two sleeper walls in late March, clearing the way for working bees on Easter Monday and the following Saturday.

And thus we were able to meet our contractual deadline and avoid a price review, with thanks to the small army of helpers who came on Monday and Saturday to deal with the weeding and sleeper installation, drainage, and backfill of the first two sleeper walls. Particular thanks to Roger and Will who were the last men standing on Saturday, though perhaps standing not in the best place when the tractor was backfilling the last bit of the wall; this is why God gave us washing machines.





It is fortunate that the southern boundary retaining wall was not required by April 12, as the approval process was lengthy. Being on an easement, we had to firstly make enquiries to SA Water and apply for their approval (November-December), and then submit an application for development to Salisbury Council (Jan 4), where it had to be assessed and go through a public notification period before Planning Consent and then Building Consent could be granted. Salisbury Council raised a concern about using plain concrete sleepers, which are smooth and susceptible to graffiti, so we agreed to use textured sleepers and all walls were then changed to use the "Kensington" style sleeper with the striated rock-like finish.

We finally received development approval on... April 12. Williams Retaining has since done the posts, so (following another working bee or three) that wall will be done and the builder will be able to start work on the footings.







So just one more wall to complete, and then the builder takes over.





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Those who helped at the working bees will have recognised poetry in motion on seeing how a 100kg piece of concrete dangling on the end of a string in mid air slides seamlessly into the gap between two perfectly parallel I-beams set in 600mm footings, so we draw this episode to a close with a poem to

celebrate our walls.

Walls of Unity (A poem by ChatGPT)

In the heart of a landscape, four walls stand tall, Retaining the earth, holding dreams for all. The builder, with hands skilled and strong, Crafts walls that will last, where they belong.


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



Pastor Steen's Books Are Available From GGLC Church Office

I was born in Denmark. We emigrated to New Zealand when I was a child, and after a year at Auckland University, I came to Adelaide to study at Luther Seminary (now Australian Lutheran College) at the start of 1971. While at the 'Sem' I was very involved in a street-level ministry called Jacob's Ladder which God used to bring many kids to faith from bikie, drug-taking and other backgrounds. (Read all about it in my book!) Almost fifty years ago Ruth married me, and we have two children, two children-in-law, and five grandchildren, all living in Adelaide at present. Hallelujah!

After graduating, we served three parishes: Hunter Valley NSW for six years; Tuggeranong ACT/Cooma NSW for eight years; and Christchurch NZ for three years. I was then elected president (now called 'bishop') of the Lutheran Church of New Zealand, which was my role for twelve years. It was during this time that I worked with Pastor Greg. Finally, I was Director for Mission in the SA-NT District (and informally WA) for a decade before retiring six years ago. While at Tuggeranong, together with Pastor Fred Veerhuis, we established the Kogudus Renewal Ministry in Australia, which ran more than 150 retreats.

In retirement it has been my privilege to continue helping out in congregations in various ways, speaking at conferences, mentoring and supporting those still on the front line, writing books [Jacob's Ladder: Missional Church in the 1970s, Spirit Filled: Normal Christian Living (with Dr Noel Due) and Bring Jesus: Making Sense of Mission—they are available from the office at GGLC] and my blog [bring Jesus - subscribe at www.lca.org.au/enews - You find it under 'LCA Districts']. I also teach a one-week intensive course for the Frontier School of Mission (Shaping Mission in 21st Century Australia).

What three words would you use to describe yourself?




